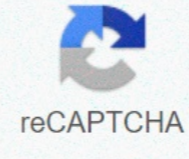




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Csudh general education worksheet

Students should consult an advisor when entering the university and every semester thereafter. For information about G.E. and other University undergraduate requirements (GWAR, units, academic status), students should contact the University Counseling Center (UAC) on WH A210 or phone (310) 243-3538. Students with declared seniors and minors should also consult the appropriate departments or departments. Academic Skills Requirements for Undergraduate Students Academic Skills Assessment Plan (as soon as possible) Students admitted to the CSUDH fall 1998 and afternoon students enrolled at the University, fall 1998 and then, are subject to the system-based internship test and reearned English and math class requirements (E.O. 665). Non-exempt students must take the English Level Test (EPT) and the Access Level Maths (ELM) exam before enrolling in classes. If the results of the tests show that recovery courses are needed in English or mathematics, students must enroll in the recovery classes required in the first semester of attendance and thereafter. Pass all recovery classes in two semesters. After two semesters, students cannot register or continue in csu classes. Dominguez Hills if all the necessary recovery classes are not finished (ENG 88/ENG 99 and MAT 3/MAT 9). In addition, students are subject to the Academic Skills Assessment Plan (as soon as possible) test if they do not exceed the level of general English education (ENG 110 and ENG 111) and mathematics (MAT 105 or equivalent) in four semesters. Finally, students are subject to disqualification from the University if they do not pass the general education level English classes (ENG 110 and ENG 111) and mathematics (MAT 105 or equivalent) in six semesters. Completion of the Graduation Writing Assessment Requirement (GWAR). California State University Executive Order 665 states that all students must demonstrate competence in writing skills at the higher division level as a graduation requirement. In addition, it states that the certification of the written competence will be made available to students as they enter their junior course [60 units]. Undergraduate students must first complete their low-division English composition courses in Area A. General Education, before attempting to complete this higher division requirement. GWAR compliance must be undertaken at the beginning of the junior year (or 60 units), and satisfied by the time 72 units are completed. GWAR can be met through one of the following options: Students must satisfy GWAR by the time they complete 72 units. GWAR can be met through one of the following options: Graduate Writing Examination (GWE) The Graduate Writing Examinations (GWE), a voluntary test for which a fee of \$35 is charged, is available to students five times per semester, in September, November, February, April and June or July. Students must earn a score of 3 or more to satisfy GWAR. Students can take the test a second time if necessary. The test can be done only twice. After two attempts at the test, students must take a course of accreditation. Information about test dates and registration procedures are available during class hours each semester, at the Test Center, Northern Library 5705, (310) 243-3909, testing@csudh.edu, or on the test website are done for students who are being important in distance education programs and other off-campus programs. While students who are being important in distance education programs can take gwe on campus, most students have the option to take it through a proctor in a place of their choice. There are three off-campus administrations per academic year, in autumn, spring and summer. Students who exercise this option must register directly with their program advisers, who will then provide them with the necessary information and materials. A provision is made for students who are not native English speakers. The GWE enrollment form asks students to indicate whether they are native English speakers. Students who declare them ed non-native speakers can choose to write their essay in two hours instead of one, although this choice should be made at the time of registration. The essays are rated together with those of native speakers in terms of global considerations of approach, understanding content, organization and grammar. Provisions are made for students with disabilities. Arrangements are made individually by the Student Disability Resource Center, Welch Hall 180, (310) 243-3660, in conjunction with the Test Center. Students should contact the student's disability Center at least 10 working days before the GWE trial date and after registering for GWE. Students should contact the Test Center for more details: (31) 243-3909, or testing@csudh.edu Certifying advanced composition course courses offered by the Department of English. The English Department regularly offers advanced composition courses (ENG 350, 3 units, A-CNC). At the end of the course an exam is administered by the Composition Cooperative (a writing test on time similar to GWE) and has 25% of the mark. Students must obtain a grade of C or higher (B or higher for graduate students) to satisfy the GWAR. Assistant of writing of higher division offered by the Department of Interdisciplinary Studies. Attached Scripture (IDS 397, 2 units, and IDS 398, 2 units, CR/NC), provides an individualized instruction in composition that is attached to writing for other courses. Students must complete both IDS 397 and IDS 398. At the end of IDS 398 an examination of the Composition Cooperative (a time writing test similar to GWE) is administered and has 50% of the mark. Students must earn credit in both IDS 397 and IDS 398 to satisfy GWAR. Transfer certification Students who have met the Graduation Scripture Assessment Requirement (GWAR) at another CSU campus in 1984 or later, but before registration at CSU, Dominguez Hills, may request GWAR compliance at CSUDH. Students must complete a GWAR compliance request at the Test Center, attaching a copy of the score or copy of the certifying test of an official file and the description of the catalogue of the relevant works. General education requirements for undergraduate General Education Program Students must follow the appropriate general education pattern (G.E.). Students who have maintained continuous assistance in any combination of CSU, UC, or the California community college under an earlier catalog may choose to complete the G.E. pattern in force at the time of entry to CSUDH graduation or entry into a California community college or state university. *Contact an adviser at the University Counseling Center for more information. General Certification of Education Accredited community colleges and four-year public schools can sanction (certify) that all or part of the general education requirements have been met (after 1980). Transferring students with full certification of the amplitude requirements of California State University General University or the CSU version of the intersegmental requirements of general education transfer (GETC) are not required to complete additional lower division courses in general education. Transfer students must apply for General Education certification at their community colleges. Another nine half-yearly units of higher division General Education courses must be completed at CSU Dominguez Hills. Double Counting General Education Courses Lower division General Education courses can be double counted in the largest or lowest. Although students can count on two General Education courses, they will not receive additional unit credit for graduation by double count.
